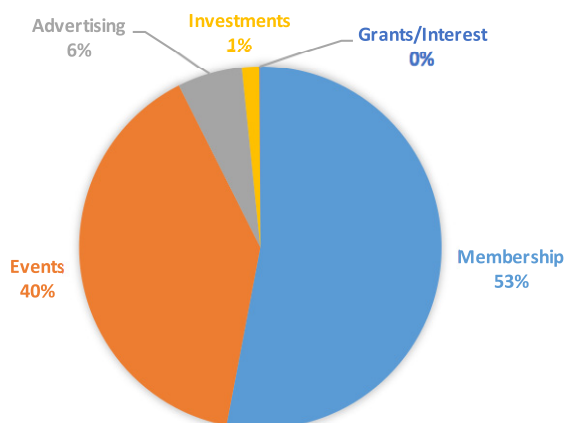

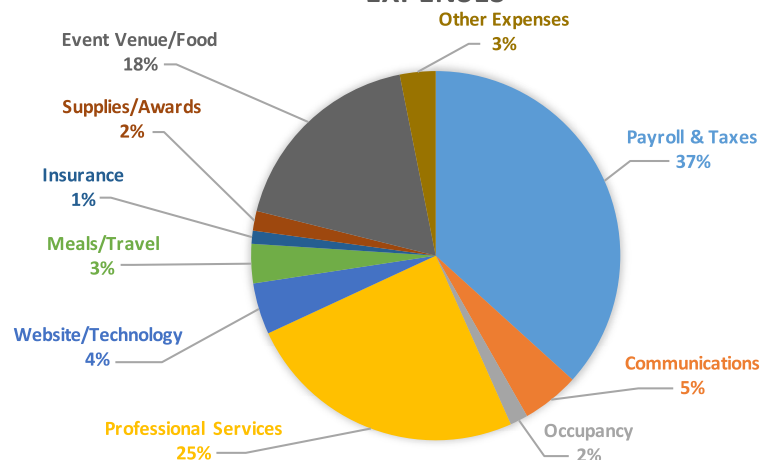

- Successful in ensuring psychologists were eligible to be members of and receive reimbursement for their work on treatment teams

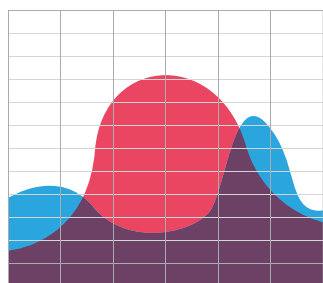

## NATIONAL ISSUES ADDRESSED BY APA COUNCIL

Indiana's APA Council Representative attended the Council of Representatives (CoR) meeting in August on behalf of Indiana psychologists. Presented issues included: Masters Training and Practice in Psychology, Commission on Ethics Processes, Diversity Workgroups, Multicultural Guidelines for the Twenty-First Century, and a Resolution Affirming Support for Research and Teaching with Nonhuman.



## DIVERSITY INITIATIVE

The purpose of the Indiana Psychological Association (IPA) Diversity Committee is to recognize and value diversity, which we define as differences within identities including but not limited to culture, economic class/status, gender, sexual/affectional orientation, mental health, religion or spiritual affiliation, age, heritage, nationality, geographic region, capabilities, job, race, and family roles.

In 2017, the Diversity Committee developed a questionnaire to survey the membership regarding the needs related to diversity and to identify any members who self-identify as having expertise in a specific area of diversity.
